Fruit/Nut	Variety	
Olive	Arbosana	Good for home orchards as it is dwarfing and grows to 12 ft. Heavy early cropping of olives which produce a green type olive oil. It has a fruity flavor, along with nutty tones, and medium pungency. Harvests October/November.
Apple - Oct ripening	Aztec Fuji *	Outstanding and consistent red blush coloring. Sweet, juicy flavor of traditional Fuji. Tree is healthy and vigorous. Harvests late season with standard Fuji. * Needs cross pollination with another variety of apple including Gala.
Apple, Aug ripening	Simmons Gala	Popular strain of Gala apple, intense red color with stripes. Is comparable in size, quality, and firmness with other Gala selections. Sweet in flavor. Harvests mid-September.
Apricot (early)	Katy	Nice, sweet apricot with large size fruit. This is a very productive variety. Chill requirement is around 250 hours. Harvests about 3 weeks before Royal Blenheim.
Apricot (mid)	Royal Blenheim	Yellow to orange-yellow. Fruit is medium-large with an orange flesh that is freestone, juicy and aromatic. Flavor is sweet and sprightly with a firm texture. It is equally valuable for canning, drying or fresh use. Early blooming. Self-fertile. Tree is very productive and can be used as a pollinizer
Apricot (late)	Moorpark	An old variety that is loved by many. Has a great, rich flavor. The harvest period is long, with fruit ripening over a long period of time. Chill requirement is around 600 hours.
Blackberry	Black Satin	Easy to grow, the Black Satin Thornless Blackberry shrub produces delicious, dark berries. Its vines are thornless. Thrives in the warm conditions of the southern and western United States, an individual mature plant can provide in excess of 10 pounds of berries.
Blueberry	Misty	Misty blueberries are medium large, sweet, spicy flavored berries. Misty is one of the most attractive, vigorous and high yielding Southern Highbush. Self pollinating, but cross pollination increases yield.
Blueberry	Sharp Blue	Medium, robust flavored berries. Sharpblue will bloom and fruit almost year round, with foliage remaining nearly evergreen. Upright, spreading bush reaching 5'-6' tall.
Cherry (mid)	Ranier *	Large, yellow fruit with a red blush. Fine-textured and distinct flavor. Vigorous, upright spreading tree. Early bearing. Very productive. Ripens mid-season. Needs cross-pollination - such as with Skeena.
Cherry (late)	Skeena	A large round firm cherry with dark red to black skin. The fruit is juicy, sweet, and has great-eating qualities. Self-fertile.
Nectarine (early)	Snow Queen	White nectarines are known for their sweetness, and Snow Queen Nectarine produces extra-sweet and juicy freestone fruits. They're tops for fresh eating, but also wonderful cooked into pies and cobblers or made into jams, jellies and preserves. It ripens early, in late June. Self-fertile.
Nectarine (mid)	Red Gold	Firm and juicy. Excellent color and flavor. High-yielding; uniformly large blemish free red fruit. High quality. Holds its firmness during storage. Self-fertile.
Nectarine (late)	Panamint	Red-skinned with yellow flesh. Great balance of acid in this fruit, with both tart and sweet notes. Panamint has low chill requirement.
Peach (early)	Desert Gold	Heat tolerant. Yellow color. Medium size fruit. Ripens in early July. Sweet taste and firm texture. Good for warm weather. Semi-freestone. Self-fertile.
Peach (mid)	Redhaven	Yellow freestone, high quality, the skin is almost entirely red in color. The firm texture makes for excellent fresh eating or freezing. Approximate harvest period: July. Self-fertile.
Peach (late)	O'Henry	Large yellow freestone with attractive red skin. The superb flavor is well-suited for fresh eating or freezing. Strong, vigorous, heavy-bearing tree. Approximate harvest period: August. Self-fruitful.
Plum (mid)	Mariposa*	Large plums with nearly freestone red flesh and a small pit. Glossy maroon over green skin. Sweet, juicy, firm and delicious with pleasantly tart skin. Also known as Improved Satsuma. Needs cross-pollination such as by Santa Rosa or Flavor Supreme.
Plum (early)	Santa Rosa	Superior quality flesh makes Santa Rosa the most widely grown plum. Purple-red skin surrounds rich, tart, fragrant, yellow flesh. Prolific, vigorous, self-fertile. Low chill.
Pluot (mid)	Flavor Supreme *	Flavor Supreme is one of the sweetest and best-flavored fruits. These pluots are 2 1/2 inches in diameter, with firm, juicy, burgundy flesh, solid red when fully ripe. A vigorous, productive tree. Ripens in July. * Needs cross pollination such as by Santa Rosa or Flavor Supreme.
Orange	Cara Cara	While they look like a typical navel orange on the outside, these have a beautiful rosey orange flesh! Seedless, juicy, and deliciously sweet. Peak season between December and April.
Clementine	Nules	Small to medium seedless clementine. Classically sweet in taste. High quality, hangs well. Ripe through October to December.
Orange	Washington Navel	Washington navel orange is California's favorite navel orange for its reliable quality, sweet flavor, seedlessness, and easy-to-peel experience. Ripens in the winter months.

^{*} The trees marked with * are not self-fertile and need cross-pollination by another variety. For Aztec Fuji apple, can use the Gala apple. For Rainier cherry, can use Skeena. For Mariposa plum and Flavor Supreme pluot, can use the other or Santa Rosa plum.

Most of the trees are potted in a biodegradable sleeve measuring about 4 inches by 12 inches. Because the trees have fine live roots, it is even more important to keep them moist until planting and to plant promptly.
