Fruit/Nut	Variety	Description
Olive	Manzanillo	A popular olive from Spain. Large, firm and flavorful olives used for eating and quality oil.
Apples - All	*	Fuji, Golden Dorsett and Anna apples are all self-fertile, but cross-pollination will increase yield.
Apple - late	Fuji	A very popular sweet, crisp and juicy apple. Excellent keeper, delicious fresh or used in baking.
Apple (v. early)	Golden Dorsett	Sweet, crisp yellow gold fruit with a pink blush. Minimum chill. Excellent for eating, cooking or cider. Similar to golden delicious but earlier and less tart.
Apple (early)	Anna	Sweet crisp yellow apple with a red blush. Bears extremely young and has very low chill requirement.
Apricot (early)	Harcot	Sweet rich yellow orange fruit. Great for eating, canning, or preserves.
Apricot (mid)	Royal Blenheim	An heirloom variety prized for its flavor and somewhat rare due to its delicate nature. Fruit is medium-large, orange, freestone, juicy and aromatic. It is equally valuable for canning, drying or fresh use.
Blackberry	Galaxy	Thornless blackberry with large, firm fruit with excellent flavor. Early season.
Blueberries - All	**	Planting two varieties of blueberries is recommended. Blueberries will bear without cross pollination but bear better with cross-pollination.
Blueberry	O'Neal **	Early-ripening with large, sweet, dark blue berries and good heat tolerance.
Blueberry	Pink Lemonade **	Known for its light pink berries that ripen from pink to reddish-purple. Produces extended harvest season.
Blueberry	Sharp Blue **	Medium, robust flavored berries. Sharpblue will bloom and fruit almost year round, with foliage remaining nearly evergreen. Upright, spreading bush reaching 5'-6' tall .
Boysenberry	Thornless	Produces large, sweet, dark maroon berries on plants with few thorns. Support on a trellis or fence.
Cherry (early)	Royal Hazel	An early ripening sweet cherry with large size and excellent sweet-tart flavor. Both Royal Hazel and Sweetheart cherries are self-fertile making them good backyard choices. Still having two varieties can significantly increase the harvest.
Cherry (late)	Sweetheart	Known for large, sweet, dark red fruit. Its late season extends the harvest period.
Nectarine (early, white)	Snow Queen	White nectarines are known for their sweetness, and Snow Queen Nectarine produces extra-sweet and juicy freestone fruits. They're tops for fresh eating, but also wonderful cooked into pies or made into preserves.
Nectarine (mid)	Red Gold	Firm and juicy. Excellent color and flavor. High-yielding; uniformly large blemish free red fruit. High quality. Holds its firmness during storage. Self-fertile.
Nectarine (mid)	Sun Glo	Large size, red blush over yellow skin, and sweet juicy flavor. Excellent for eating, canning, or preserving.
Nectarine (late)	Goldmine	Popular heirloom variety known for excellent flavor and texture. Yellow/white flesh.
Peach (early)	Desert Gold	Heat tolerant. Yellow color. Medium size fruit. Ripens in early July. Sweet taste and firm texture. Good for warm weather. Semi-freestone. Self-fertile.
Peach (mid)	Redhaven	Yellow freestone, high quality, the skin is almost entirely red in color. The firm texture makes for excellent fresh eating or freezing. Approximate harvest period : July. Self-fertile.
Peach (late mid)	Gleason Elberta	Yellow freestone, large fruit, and yellow skin. Juicy with yellow flesh. Great for eating, canning, or freezing.
Peach (late)	O'Henry	Large yellow freestone with attractive red skin. The superb flavor is well-suited for fresh eating or freezing. Strong, vigorous, heavy-bearing tree. Approximate harvest period : August. Self-fruitful.
Plum (late)	Elephant Heart	Large, heart-shaped plum with deep red flesh and reddish purple skin. Firm, sweet, and juicy.
Plum (early)	Santa Rosa	Superior quality flesh makes Santa Rosa the most widely grown plum. Purple-red skin surrounds rich, tart, fragrant, yellow flesh. Prolific, vigorous, self-fertile. Low chill.
Plumcot (mid/late)	Dapple Dandy *	Popular variety with sweet-tart, juicy white and pink flesh. Yellow with maroon dapple skin. Needs cross pollination with another variety plum or plumcot including Santa Rosa plum or Flavor Supreme plumcot.
Plumcot (mid)	Flavor Supreme *	Flavor Supreme is one of the sweetest and best-flavored fruits, with firm, juicy, burgundy flesh, solid red when fully ripe. Ripens in July. * Needs cross pollination such as by Santa Rosa or Dapple Dandy.
Orange	Cara Cara	While looking like a navel orange on the outside, the Cara Cara have a beautiful roseate flesh. Seedless, juicy, and sweet. Peak season between December to April.
Orange	Washington Navel	Washington navel orange is California's favorite navel orange for its reliable quality, sweet flavor, seedlessness, and easy-to-peel experience. Ripens in the winter months.
Lemon	Lisbon	A popular lemon, juicy, tart, and nearly seedless. Great for cooking or lemonade. Potential for year-round fruit.
Clementine	Nules	Small to medium seedless clementine. Classically sweet in taste. High quality, hangs well. Ripe through October to December.
Mandarin	W.Murcott	Also known as a honey tangerine, it is sweet, juicy, easy to peel and excellent for eating or juicing.

* The plumcots marked with * are not self-fertile and need cross-pollination by another variety of plum or plumcot.

All the trees are potted in a biodegradable sleeve measuring about 4 inches by 12 inches. Because the trees have fine live roots, it is essential to keep them moist until
